John Edward Kelly was called up in October 1917 when he was 18 years old. After a period of training, he was drafted to France in April 1918. He was killed on the 20th August that year, before he reached his 19th birthday. He is buried at Bucquoy Road Cemetery, Ficheux, France.

He was the only son of John and Mary Kelly of 6, Oak Lane, Hooton. He was known as Jack and was very tall. He was educated at Willaston School and was a member of Willaston Scout Troop. There is reference to him in the poem, 'To Our M.M. and Old Scout'. Later on he joined the Eastham Church Lads' Brigade and there attained the rank of Sergeant. Prior to enrolment he became a chief clerk in the office of the Gum Tragosol Supply Co. Ltd, Hooton.
