
1982 Referendum to Decide whether to have a Parish Council

In 1982, Ellesmere Port and Neston Borough Council carried out a review to decide whether to have parishes in the Borough. There was an initial public meeting, following which the Council decided to hold a referendum. The boundary for the proposed Willaston parish is shown:



The Residents' Society was divided in their views and decided to adopt a neutral approach. They suggested the key reasons to vote for a parish council were:

- 1. It is a democratically elected group of individuals
- 2. It has statutory power to be formally consulted on all local issues
- 3. Because it is a statutory body, it can represent the interests of the village more effectively and get things done.

The reasons against were:

- 1. There will be an additional cost to householders in the village. The informal way things are done works quite well so why change things?
- 2. There will be another level of bureaucracy.
- 3. It could introduce party politics into some issues in the village.

The suggestion was that a village of Willaston's size would have about 9 councillors.

The cost for householders would be between £3 and £4 a year.

The outcome of the referendum was against establishing a parish council.
